## Cascarones!

Earlier this month Olga Martinez (of the Service Learning Office) taught us how to make cascarones which are a tradition among many Latin American and Hispanic cultures, especially around Easter.

Like Easter Eggs, cascarones are colored eggshells, only the egg shells are empty and painted instead of dyed. After the painted shells dry, they are filled with confetti and the ends are sealed with tissue paper. The completed eggs are then hidden and the hunt begins! Participants in the hunt find and collect as many eggs as possible and, finally, break them over each other's heads, until everyone is covered in confetti.



Olga shared with us the history of the modern tradition, which has its roots all over the world! The origins of the painted egg shells date back to China, and it is said that Marco Polo brought the tradition back to Europe. In Italy it then became a courtship ritual, as men would fill the eggs with powdered perfume present them to the women they liked. Eventually this practice spread to many countries and became the tradition it is today in Mexico, Latin America and the Southwestern United States.

Cascarones are most common around Easter, as the breaking of the eggs represents not only wishes of good luck, but the resurrection of Christ.

# Steps to make your own Cascarones:

- 1. Get some uncooked eggs.
- 2. Empty the egg by gently tapping the bottom of the shell to create a small hole to pour the egg out.
- 3. Use the eggs! Cook them and eat them!
- 4. Rinse out the eggshells and set aside to dry.
- 5. When they have dried, paint them, but be careful not to break them!
- 6. Set them aside to dry.
- 7. Carefully fill the painted shell with confetti.
- 8. Apply some glue around the opening of the eggshell and place tissue paper over the end to seal it. Set aside to dry.
- Once dry, surprise your roommate by cracking your Cascarone on their head! The semester is over! It's time to celebrateIIII

# **Residence Hall**

# <u>ISO</u>

Do you have all your paperwork in order? Depending on whether or not you are coming back next semester, you might have some paperwork to complete. Transferring? Leaving? Extending your Stay? Make sure you've filled out the proper forms (all located on the wall next to room 1209) and have submitted them!

Going home for the summer? Or maybe going on a fantastic vacation? If you are leaving the country, you need to get your I-20 signed by either Grace Philson or Amy Dickerson *before you leave*. **If you leaving and returning, you must be registered full-time for next semester before your I-20 can be signed**.

In order to move out you must make an appointment with your RA or RC to complete your room inventory check. There is a signup sheet by the RA's door—make sure you sign up at least 24 hours in advance. Upon moving out room and mail keys must be returned to your RA. There is a fee if you do not complete this check out procedure.

Please remember quiet hours will be in effect 24 hours a day during finals week (4/21–4/27). Please be respectful of your neighbors.
